Ross House Association continues to make incredible energy savings as a result of sustainability works to the building, behaviour change and continued commitment from the entire Ross House community. Compared to 2012 the reduction is remarkable. The spike in usage you see in November, was due to the unusually high temperatures experienced in November this year.

At the Ross House Association AGM (on the 15th November 2017), five new committee members were elected including David Martin as Deputy Chair. Valerie Elliott stepped down from the role of Chairperson and I was appointed to the position. I would like to personally thank Val for her work as Chair over the last 4 years. Fortunately Val's experience is not lost to us as she remains as an ordinary committee member.

Thursday 30th November 2017 saw the first meeting of the new RHA Committee, as we welcomed an appropriate mix of new and existing committee members. It would seem with no particular gender equality based efforts, we have managed to secure a 50:50 ratio of women and men within our numbers. That says a lot about the Ross House community and is yet another reason to support the unique and alternative model, that is Ross House. So many organisations, political parties and committees struggle to achieve such equality of inclusion.



Reflecting on my own experience, it can take a while to settle into the Committee and adjust to existing dynamics or be part of creating new ones. As the new Chairperson I look forward to contributing to a vibrant, and focused committee by supporting all members to have an equal voice in the decisions we make on behalf of our building and community.

With the experience of an interesting and at times quite challenging five years on the committee (four as Deputy Chair), I know just how much time and commitment is required. Our decision making is a great responsibility- not only the actual decisions we make, but the way we make them. Being well informed, listening to all, questioning all we do not readily understand or are unfamiliar with and above all respecting the right of others to voice an opinion. Also importantly, seeking to overcome any negativity and working as a team with a positive approach to find workable solutions.

Along with the current community engagement underway, its outcomes for an informed strategic plan, the new train station works on our doorstep and meeting financial challenges there will be much for the committee to address in 2018. All this will guide our direction for the immediate future and beyond in keeping Ross House a home for groups.

Melbourne Metro Rail Project Update

The demolition of Port Phillip Arcade is about to get underway. Here are the key pieces of information you should know:

- Demolition of buildings between Young & Jackson and the Nicholas Building are ongoing.
- Removal of asbestos from Port Phillip Arcade is underway with licenced contractors.
- City Power are decommissioning the substation within Port Phillip Arcade.
- Demolition works to Port Phillip Arcade will commence in January and run through until late March 2018
- There will not be an acoustic shed on the CBD South site due to two factors;
 - only day works will be undertaken at this site, where as the sites with an acoustic shed will operate 24/7
 - * A 9 storey, 40m tower will be built over the CBD South station at the same time the station is being built.
- CBD South will be called Town Hall Station
- A gantry will be built over Royston Lane to ensure access to the Ross House car park.
- A scaffold will be built up the side of Port Phillip Arcade in Royston Lane, above the gantry. This will be boarded up and covered in carpet to reduce noise. Sprinklers will be in place to mitigate dust from the site.

Grants News

Top Grant Writing Tips

I. Follow the guidelines and align your project to what the funder is looking for. If you're unsure, contact the grant provider directly.

2. If you see a grant that you may be eligible for but it closes in less than 7 days – think twice! Quality applications require plenty of time and attention.

3. Keep it short. Sometimes grant providers have to read 100's of applications. Concise yet informative applications will stand out and be appreciated.

4. In strategic giving, it's all about the outcomes. Be focussed on your outcome and how this aligns with your organisation's mission statement.

5. Acknowledge your key risks and how you will mitigate them.

6. Advise how success will be measured.

There are many grants open at the moment, but here are a couple that look great.

The ANZ Staff Foundation Grants is currently open and offering grants up to \$5,000. Submissions are due by 15 January 2018.

The ANZ Staff Foundation is funded by regular contributions made by ANZ staff and ANZ. The Foundation aims to support projects run by charitable organisations, which offer a direct and tangible benefit to local communities. In addition to providing funding for community projects, ANZ staff are also actively encouraged to support the work of the ANZ Staff Foundation by volunteering their time and skills to support the projects.

The ANZ Staff Foundation provides grants of up to \$5,000 to community projects that relate to one or more of the following areas:

- Education and employment examples of suitable projects may include purchasing educational resources for communities or programs that help people prepare for employment.
- Financial capability examples of suitable projects may focus on improving financial literacy or money saving capability.
- Urban sustainability examples of a suitable project may focus on improving environmental education programs or revegetation programs.

The lan Potter Foundation's Conference Grants Program is currently open and offering grants of up to \$20,000. Submissions are due 30th January 2018.

The Ian Potter Foundation's Conference Program area supports the exchange and dissemination of ideas and knowledge across a global stage by assisting organisations to bring international keynote speakers to Australia.

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Conference grants are awarded a maximum amount of \$20,000 and the request can only be for funding towards the travel and accommodation costs associated with hosting international keynote speakers (speaker's appearance fees are not covered).

The Ian Potter Foundation can only make grants to organisations with both DGR Item 1 and TCC status.

Strategic Plan Development: Community Engagement Update

Thank you to all of our members and tenants who completed the survey during the month of November. Your feedback is important to us.

Consultants Desley Renton and Martin de los Rios were impressed with the response rate and with the quality of information received. We received 86 responses from an impressive group: tenants, occasional tenants, funding bodies, meeting room users and friends.



In addition to the surveys, 18 one on one interviews were undertaken with a range of individuals and groups from diverse perspectives and back grounds. The interviews provided an opportunity for individuals and groups to express their hopes and aspirations for a sustainable future for the Association.

The feedback received from both the surveys and the interviews will be collated and will help to inform the next stage of the engagement process. This information will also be shared with the broader Ross House Association (RHA) community.

The next stage of the engagement process is already underway; the development of a Collaborative Team. The Collaborative Team will be made up of 17 individuals. This group will include both randomly selected and invited members, tenants and friends.

The Collaborative Team volunteers will meet for a total of 21 hours between February and May 2018, (spilt into four separate meetings). The task of the Collaborative Team will be to consider the community engagement feedback and a range of other information sources including research and technical expert opinion. The group will be independently facilitated and robust dialogue will be encouraged.

The recommendations put forward by the Collaborative Team will directly influence the future strategic direction of RHA.

We would like to thank everyone who has invested their time and energy towards the development of the Strategic Plan so far. The commitment to this process is testimony to a collective desire to see Ross House Association flourish and grow into the future.
