There's always a lot going on in this big old building of ours, so please make sure you keep an eye out for the building maintenance emails that circulate regularly.



### Upcoming works / happenings

- The NBN node has been installed and CitiPower has connected to the meter more information to come from Nazz once we know an update.
- In the upcoming weeks, there will be two new TV screens installed at each of the Ross House entrance, to display daily bookings of the meeting rooms. These screens will be large and will have easily readable text, and will replace the current chalkboards.

## Reflections by the RHA Chairperson - Christine McAuslan

Like any 30 year old, the Ross House community is highly likely to face its share of challenges into the future.

One such challenge is keeping this old heritage building afloat. There is always something that demands attention. Undoubtedly tenants and visitors have noticed the dust and noise from the demolition next door. Dust entering the building required urgent action for those lovely old windows on the east side of the building to be sealed. A task our General Manager promptly organised and the sealing work beginning just as quickly by our heritage building expert. Just one small example of the financial demands on keeping Ross House a safe place for its users.

As we work towards maintaining Ross House into the future there will be many knowns and unknowns to address. Committees, staff and members will come and go as they have over the last 30 years. Much of the previous knowledge and memories will disappear as time moves on and new skills, experience and knowledge inform Ross House according to its needs. Having a strategic plan is one of the must have tools that assists us to build the path towards the sustainability of the Ross House Community. To this end, the Collaborative Team members have been busy formulating ideas towards a new plan.

The team recently made its final presentation to the committee. We are now at the stage where the committee will form a draft strategic plan for the next 5 years. There will need to be some priorities made, as to what is affordable and can be implemented sooner rather than later, and those items that will need research and specific finances sought or allocated. This highlights the fact that this is a 5 year plan and implementation will take time.

With budgeting well underway for the 2018-2019 financial year there will be much careful consideration of the Strategic Plan Draft and its contents in the next weeks. We look forward to presenting that work to the community.

On another note it was with great sadness we heard last week of the death of Andrew Dally. Farewell Andrew, from all your friends at Ross House.

## Community Consultation: Strategic Planning Update

As you are aware, we are developing a new Strategic Plan for Ross House Association.

### **PHASE 1 - CONSULTATION**

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Phase 1 is complete, where we engaged with the broader Ross House community via a survey and interviews with many different stakeholders. The results of this consultation process have been compiled into two reports, available in hard copy from Collaboration HQ in the Foyer at Ross House.

### PHASE 2 – THE COLLABORATIVE TEAM

Phase 2 is now complete; the Collaborative Team process. This involved 14 individuals representing the diverse Ross House community coming together in a series of meetings during February and March to discuss ideas and provide recommendations on the strategic directions and actions RHA should take in the next 5 years.

On Wednesday 28th March, the Collaborative Team presented their recommended priorities and strategies to the RHA Committee of Management at a meeting that was open to the entire membership.

### PHASE 3 - WRITING THE STRATEGIC PLAN (we are here!)

This phase is currently underway; taking the recommendations made by the Collaborative Team, the RHA Committee of Management & Staff, along with reps from the Collaborative Team, have completed a draft Ross House Association Strategic Plan for 2019-2023. This draft will be provided to the Ross House community for comment, before being voted into effect by the RHA Committee of Management later in the year.

The Committee of Management are thrilled to be undertaking this engagement process and we are very much looking forward to a positive and collaborative outcome. If you have any questions about the strategic planning process, please feel free to contact the RHA staff members at any time.

## "Access is my disability, NOT my wheelchair."

Disability Resource Centre (DRC) is currently working on a Transport Accessibility Project and they have been travelling around Victoria, meeting people with disabilities and their advocates, to discuss priorities for making public transport, taxis and Uber more accessible.

DRC will be compiling all this information into a final report which will be submitted to the Victorian Government later this year.

# Beyond Zero Emissions - International Recognition for Australian Climate Solutions

Beyond Zero Emissions (BZE) is a climate solutions think tank located on the 4th floor of Ross House. Their mission is to show that a zero emissions Australia is achievable and affordable.



BZE's research shows how Australia's energy sector, land use and agriculture, transport and housing, industry and export sectors can transition to zero emissions in ten years. Their research has produced a complete blueprint for Australia to become a thriving zero emissions economy.

BZE's collaboration with a large national network of scientists, engineers, economists and expert advisors has won them international recognition. For three years in a row, BZE has ranked as one of the top international think tanks by the Lauder Institute of the University of Pennsylvania. The Institute ranks international think tanks each year and releases its findings in its "Global Go To Think Tank Index Reports". This ranking assists academics, journalists, donors and the public to connect to the leading centres of public policy research around the world.

In 2017, BZE was ranked 50th, out of over 6,500 international think tanks. BZE is one of only six Australian think tanks in this ranking, alongside high-profile Australian think tanks, such as the Grattan Institute. www.bze.org.au

## Melbourne Metro Rail Project Update

Planned and Current Works:

- Demolition of buildings between Young & Jackson and the Nicholas Building is complete.
- Demolition works to Port Phillip Arcade are complete.
- The oversite development (OSD) will be a 40m retail/commercial tower. The City of Melbourne are trying to lease two floors for a new City Library.
- Royston Lane will be used as a service lane for loading docks and waste. They are currently modelling traffic flow. Concept plans will be available by the end of April.
- Degraves Recycling Facility may be expanded to help with waste from the station and OSD.
- Piling works for the OSD will commence in Q3 of 2018, actual above ground construction will take place from 2022-2026.
- Campbell Arcade works will commence from August 2019, tenant leases there expire July 2019. Access to Degraves St under Flinders St will remain for the duration of the works.

### **Dust Issues**

There have been a number of issues regarding dust from the Melbourne Metro site. We have requested an increase to water sprays to minimise the dust getting out of the site and sealed all casement windows on the east elevation to prevent dust ingress. There is also a dust monitor in place now, which provides data to the construction company in real time. Hopefully these changes will significantly reduce the level of dust getting into Ross House. ## Top Grant Writing Tips

- I. Follow the guidelines and align your project to what the funder is looking for. If you're unsure, contact the grant provider directly.
- 2. If you see a grant that you may be eligible for but it closes in less than 7 days think twice! Quality applications require plenty of time and attention.
- 3. Keep it short. Sometimes grant providers have to read 100's of applications. Concise yet informative applications will stand out and be appreciated.
- 4. In strategic giving, it's all about the outcomes. Be focussed on your outcome and how this aligns with your organisation's mission statement.
- 5. Acknowledge your key risks and how you will mitigate them.
- 6. Advise how success will be measured.

## **Grants News**

There are many grants open at the moment, but here are a couple that look great.

The Bank of Melbourne's Neighbourhood Fund opens on 7<sup>th</sup> May and is offering grants of up to \$50,000. Submissions are due 15<sup>th</sup> June 2018.

The Bank of Melbourne's Neighbourhood Fund supports charities who receive little or no government funding and aren't big enough to generate significant fundraising income of their own.

The Bank of Melbourne supports local charities and programs that deliver sustainable benefits to Victorian communities by investing in projects that will improve the lives of Victorian communities who are physically, socially or economically disadvantaged.

To be eligible for funding you must be:

- endorsed as a DGR Item 1
- Docated in Victoria
- focussed on helping neighbourhoods and local communities
- have an annual gross revenue of less than \$3 million

The Community Sector Banking and Community Enterprise Foundation's Social Investment Grants Program opens on 1<sup>st</sup> May and is offering grants of up to \$50,000. Submissions are due 31st May 2018.

The Social Investment Grants Program funds not-for-profit projects or programs working to improve social outcomes for marginalised and disadvantaged people. The 2018 funding round will aim to build resilience and capability in people experiencing homelessness or domestic abuse.

Applications can be made for grants of either \$25,000 or \$50,000.

To be eligible for funding, applicants must:

- be a not-for-profit organisation
- have the activities of the funded program completed by the end of 2019

## Congratulations to The Sunflower Foundation

The Sunflower Foundation's biggest news is that they have made it through to the second round of the *Telstra Small Business Awards*! Congratulations!

Currently, their two long-term projects are innovative, multi-disciplinary programs for girls living in appalling conditions in the slums of Kenya. Both programs are designed to not only build the girls literacy and numeracy skills, but to develop the girls as leaders within their communi-



ties. They will learn to use technology and publish their own stories to circulate in their communities where books are in very short supply.

Both programs reach out to parents and local schools to empower teachers to improve the way they teach literacy. *The Literacy Garden,* located in rural western Kenya (outside Kisumu), will also incorporate sustainable agriculture, a bore well (to save the girls trekking 5 miles or more for water) and a Literacy Week, where the girls can celebrate their writing.

Pass the Mic! A Literacy, Arts and Technology program is located in Kibera outside Nairobi in Kenya.

## Waste not Want not - The Degraves Street Recycling Facility update

This month, The Degraves Street Recycling Facility (in the Ross House basement carpark), has been busier than ever reaching new heights in landfill diversion.

So far this year they have diverted 92,437kg of waste from landfill and this number is growing daily. This number is the combined total of waste streams including; food & organic waste, comingled recycling, cardboard, waxed cardboard, soft plastics, hard plastics, e-waste, hard waste and polystyrene.

By the end of this month, it will be well and truly over the 100,000kg milestone which puts them on track for their biggest year yet. The team are constantly evolving to meet the needs of over 100 traders in the area with three new traders coming on board during April alone. Together, we continue to create a greener community.

for Oromia work towards the realisation of their vision; a world where all people are empowered to manage problems and to create opportunity for themselves and others.


## **Australia for UNHCR**
