

Building and Maintenance


FROM THE ROSS HOUSE TEAM

Metro Rail Update

FROM THE ROSS HOUSE TEAM

These are the planned and current works for the Melbourne Metro Rail Project. Construction works within the Town Hall Station precinct during April 2024 include:

- station entrance construction and build-out works
- station passenger area and operational rooms construction and fit-out
- Campbell Arcade restoration works including fit-out of the underground passenger connection to Flinders Street Station
- lift installations within the Degraves Subway at Flinders Street Station
- pedestrian ramp widening works on Collins Street and Swanston Street and train testing through the tunnel.

- Please keep communal spaces, including kitchens, clean and tidy for use by others.



Tenant Feature: Disability Resources Centre

ROOM 3.11

Disability Resources Centre (DRC) is a values-led advocacy and campaigning organisation run by and for people with disability.

Together we centre Disability Justice, we practice Disability Pride and we work in solidarity with other disability human rights organisations. DRC represents disabled people across the state and works to uphold our rights and choices. Established in 1981, we have a long history of campaigning for equality and inclusion here in Victoria.

DRC hosts Belong, a radically inclusive network that aims to connect absolutely everyone in the disability community. You may have physical/sensory disability, intellectual disability, psychosocial disability, neurodiversity, chronic illness or you may be self-diagnosed: whatever your disability experience, culture, age or geography, you are welcome here. Belong members meet online and face-to-face to build connections, share experiences and be there for one another.

Belong facilitates a raft of meetings each week. Once a month, for example, we host art and making afternoons held in Ross House and also online. Led by disabled artists, we use different media and try out different ideas each time we meet. Belong hosts campaign meetings, guest speakers and topic-based discussions.

We connect via chat platforms, zoom and email. We share opportunities and collaborate on submissions. The Belong Rainbow Collective for disabled LGBTQIA+ members, and those who are questioning their gender or sexuality, meets monthly on zoom.

DRC also offers an individual advocacy service which strives to meet people where they are. We understand that the multiple barriers we all face makes life complex, and that at times you need someone in your corner. Our advocates are very experienced and have established cross-sector partnerships. If there is a problem, you don't know how to solve, we can either help or point you in the right direction.

DRC also leads and supports campaigns for disability rights, including the campaign for universally accessible public transport. We respond to systemic issues when they arise, and we collaborate on community-based campaigns.



CEO's International Day of Happiness Address

"I would like to begin by acknowledging the traditional owners of the land on which we are meeting today, the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin Nation, and pay my respects to their Elders past, present and emerging. Welcome everyone to our first event of 2024, the Welcome Back Brunch. We are hosting today's event on the United Nations International Day of Happiness. As we look around the world and watch current event on the news, it is perhaps more important than ever that we focus on what makes us happy, both as a society and as individuals.

The resolution to proclaim the 20th of March as International Day of Happiness was initiated by Bhutan in 2012. Bhutan has recognized the value of national happiness over national income since the early 1970s and famously adopted the goal of Gross National Happiness over Gross National Product.

Happiness is a fundamental human goal. The United Nations General Assembly recognizes this goal and calls for "a more inclusive, equitable and balanced approach to economic growth that promotes the happiness and wellbeing of all peoples."

So, we must ask, what habits, institutions and material conditions produce a society where people have higher well-being?

The World Happiness Report has studied these questions each year, by comparing the average life satisfaction in different countries and seeing what features in the population explain these differences. The findings show that the ethos of a country matters – are people trustworthy, generous, and mutually supportive? The institutions also matter – are people free to make important life decisions? And the material conditions of life matter – both income and health.

One of the key factors to happiness, which I think is relevant to Ross House is that of altruism, cooperation, and fairness. The World Happiness Report defines these as pro-social behaviours, something we might define at Ross House as working towards social justice.

However, sadly this work does not always bring happiness. Full-time voluntary caregivers, looking after vulnerable children or elderly parents, often report quite low, life-satisfaction. Caregiving is rewarding, but also difficult and painful and needs social support.

The report calls for special institutions to support the hard work of caregivers. Something that organisations at Ross House have been doing for many years. So, the work that goes on in this building is vital and contributes significantly to the happiness of our society. It is something we should be proud of. So, I invite you all today to share with those next to you, what makes you happy?

On a personal note, I have two young children, seven and five years old, so I am quite busy and don't often get out much between school drop offs, commuting, full-time work, cooking dinners, cleaning up, and bedtime routines. So, it is the small things in life that bring happiness. Running tree to tree in the rain, with the kids laughing because I forgot the umbrellas, cycling to work along the Mullum Mullum and Kooyong creeks and seeing people grow and improve in the martial art that I teach.

So please enjoy today, share with others what makes you happy, if you would like to, and let's celebrate the happiness that Ross House has brought to many lives over its 37-year history

. Thank you."

Inclusive Meeting Training

BY VOICE AT THE TABLE (VATT)

What is Voice at the Table?

People with cognitive disability are often excluded from committees and consultations. The Voice at the Table Project seeks to create change and ensure that people with cognitive disability can have a real and equal voice on boards, committees, and consultations. This includes people with intellectual disability and acquired brain injury.

What do we do?

- Training for people with cognitive disability about speaking up
- Inclusive meeting training for organisations.
- Meetups for people with cognitive disability who have done training.

Who is the inclusive meetings training for?

Staff working for organisations aiming to ensure people with cognitive disabilities have a genuine say. For example, for committee members, support staff, or people organising consultations.

What do you learn?

- Why inclusive practice is important.
- To identify and understand the barriers to participation for people with cognitive disability.
- · Ways to make your meetings welcoming.
- Skills and techniques for getting people with cognitive disability to open up and speak confidently.

How is training delivered?

- Online or in person.
- Training is co-designed and co-facilitated by people with cognitive disability in line with the VATT motto, 'Nothing about us without us'.
- Using plain and easy English.


The Ross House team would like to thank the membership for their wonderful window displays! We know how much effort and planning goes into each display.
