

Ground Floor Commercial Lease Update: Significant Building Works Underway

It has been an extremely busy June at Ross House with construction works occurring on multiple levels throughout the building. Following the signing of the ground floor commercial lease on 23rd May 2024, significant changes have been underway at Ross House to meet the July 1st handover date. The Ross House office and reception has moved to level 3, we are busy creating a new resources area, pigeon holes for mail and a warm and inviting space for members, tenants and visitors to Ross House. We would love to see you if you want to drop in for a look and a chat.

All remaining tenants have been relocated from the ground floor and the entire space has been stripped back to a concrete shell. Dukes Coffee had a store room on ground level and this has now been relocated to level 1. The kitchenette space on level 1 has also been redesigned to make it a more open and accessible space. I would like to thank all the tenants and regular facility users on level 1 for being patient as the works have been disruptive over the past few weeks.

Over the next few months, as we get more settled, we will improve wayfinding from the street level entrance up to level 3 reception, create a communal space around the reception area and further afield, look to replace the accessible ground floor toilets. We will be seeking ideas and suggestions for these upgrades so please get in touch if you have any thoughts. And keep a lookout in your emails and on our social media for upcoming opportunities for community consultation.

FROM THE ROSS HOUSE TEAM


There is always a lot going on in this big old building of ours, so please make sure you keep an eye out for the building maintenance emails that circulate regularly.

Metro Rail Update

FROM THE ROSS HOUSE TEAM

These are the planned and current works for the Melbourne Metro Rail Project. Construction works within the Town Hall Station precinct during June 2024 include:

- Station entrance construction within the City Square, Flinders Quarter and Federation Square sites
- Flinders Street drainage works &water main renewal works on Swanston Street to be completed by Greater Western Water
- Campbell Arcade restoration works including fit-out of the underground passenger connection to Flinders Street Station
- Lift installations within the Degraves Subway at Flinders Street Station & removal of site sheds and gantries & installation of an underground stormwater tank on Swanston Street
- Train testing through the tunnel.

These are some of the grants and assistance programs currently available that we think might interest you.

Albert & Barbara Tucker Foundation

Each year, the Tucker Foundation considers applications from organisations seeking to undertake projects that further the Foundation's aims and objectives, including:

- The relief of poverty and the suffering of children.
- The provision of or support for scholarships to disadvantaged children or young adults up to the age of twenty-five years.
- The protection of women from abuse.
- The initiation and support of social change which goes towards increasing the equal treatment and social acceptance of all persons in the community.
- The protection of wildlife and habitat.
- Protection of animals from cruelty.

Funding: Up to \$25,000

Eligibility: Not-for-profits, DGR status required.

Round: Opens on 1st July and closes on 31st August 2024.

Sisters of Charity Foundation Community Grants Program

Aimed at helping groups who make a huge difference to those in need, but struggle to find funding through other avenues. They may be ineligible for government assistance, or be to small or lacking the right market appeal to attract attention of larger organisations.

Favours programs that:

- Provide compassion, hope and practical assistance
- Fall between the cracks of other funding sources
- Are not associated with well established organisations with significant reserves and/or are not capable of raising their own funds
- Are not eligible for funding from government or other sources.

Funding: Up to \$15,000

Eligibility: Not-for-profits, DGR status required.

Round: opens on 8th July and closes on 31st July 2024.

Department of Home Affairs: Cyber Awareness Support for Vulnerable Groups

The Australian Government is inviting applications via an open competitive process to apply to deliver services under the Cyber Security Program – Cyber Awareness Support for Vulnerable Groups from 2024–25 to 2026–27.

The program will help to expand the national cyber security awareness campaign to uplift cyber security outreach and literacy among the Australian community.

What will be funded?

Some examples of eligible grant activities that may be undertaken include:

- translation services for cyber security advice
- tailoring guidance materials to suit target cohorts
- training session or workshops
- online courses
- community events and consultations
- one-on-one support
- providing printed or online outreach materials.

Housing for the Aged Action Group (HAAG) is a member-based, community organisation that was established in 1983 and have been at Ross House since 1991.

Coming from grass-roots beginnings 40 years ago, HAAG today is over 800 members strong.

They work towards the alleviation of housing related poverty for older Australians through our advocacy work and their service – Home at Last.

Home at Last Service

The Home at Last service provides accessible, equitable and appropriate support and housing information to older people who are homeless or facing homelessness.

Their services range from providing tailored housing information to assistance with housing applications, support during the move and referrals into aged care and other supports.

A key component of their work focuses on early intervention, where we engage with communities directly to reach people before a crisis point.

Story of Change

This month at Assisi Aid Projects, we wanted to highlight the incredible impact achieved through our projects and partners, by sharing the story of one of our project participants.

Our Jajal Wae Sustainable Agrotourism project in Indonesia, implemented by our partner Dreamdelion, increases the confidence, leadership skills and business acumen of women in the Ngawi region of East Java, as well as providing them with opportunities to create sustainable sources of income.

Before her involvement in the project, Bu Asih was concerned with the limited opportunities available to the women in her community, beyond traditional roles as mothers and wives. Hoping to create a positive platform for women to engage in more productive activities, she established a community group for 25 women in her village, "Mahmud", focused on group savings. Since teaming up with Dreamdelion last year, Mahmud has expanded activities and started a vegetable picking tourism initiative, garnering appreciation at the Ngawi district level. This recognition has served as a reminder to the women that they possess significant potential to be powerful agents of positive change in their communities.

Bu Asih said: "I am so happy and proud of the Mahmud community... together we have produced a total of 100 kg of vegetables, with an approximate value of Rp 8,000,000 (AUD \$767). We could not imagine before that we could create such an amount that now can be used to purchase more plant seeds, farming equipment, and land maintenance."



This accessibility augmentation project was funded with a grant of \$245,000 by the Australian Government.





Adrian is the creator of the Ross House Clock. It was a privilege to learn more about the concept and design of the clock from Adrian. He also spoke in praise of working with Glenn Romanis, the artist of the clock, 24 years ago.

Their words from when the clock was first unveiled still resonate and are worth revisiting all these years later...

The following is an article written at the time of the unveiling of the Ross House Clock.

"On the 14th December,2000 at Ross House, Adrian Raysmith and Glenn Romanis unveiled a clock that was created for our building. It is up on the 4th floor of the foyer area adjacent to the Hayden Raysmith room. The clock maker, Adrian Raysmith wrote Science has been measuring things since enquiring minds first searched for answers. The measurement of time began dramatic improvements from about the 1300's onwards, ever refining and ever increasing it's power and control over a wider portion of the community till today we are almost unaware of it's ubiquitous effects.

The advent of the global communication revolution we are experiencing is further reducing our personal awareness of the natural cycles that are a part of us all.

It is important that good timing and coordination are an efficient part of our modern society. It would be chaotic if there were no standard and no adherence to it, however there needs to be a balance of regimental performance and the respect for each individuals rhythmic cycles.

The purpose of the design of the Ross House Clock is to, just for a moment, remind us of other cycles of nature going on around us moment by moment. That is why the minute and second hands have been removed and the twelve hour arc of the sun or moon going across the sky more closely mimics the real thing. The hours are still easily measured but they do not speak down to us with a metered tic, toc, tic, toc, "you're running late, work faster, run, rush".

This clock tries to say: "Have time to speak to someone, look for a moment at the birds, plants, weather, close your eyes for a moment and relax, walk from your path to smell a flower." Value yourself in the rhythm of your life a little more.

Glenn Romanis, the artist, had a few words to say about his work on the clock and what the art symbolized.

The central figure – Bunjil, the Creator for the Kulin nation, has here taken on the form of the Wedge tailed Eagle – being one of the 2 skin groups. The other skin group is Waa (normally depicted by the Crow).

The line work above the wings represents one skin group, and below the wings represents another skin group.

The Yarra River is used here because it is specific to this area.

The Southern Cross has been added to depict reconciliation. We are all from many different backgrounds but are all under the same sky. Glenn Romanis."

Glenn Romanis has gone on to do over 200 large scale projects and you will recognise his art in many locations.


