FROM THE ROSS HOUSE TEAM


There is always a lot going on in this big old building of ours, so please make sure you keep an eye out for the building maintenance emails that circulate regularly.

Metro Rail Update

FROM THE ROSS HOUSE TEAM

These are the planned and current works for the Melbourne Metro Rail Project. Construction works within the town Hall Station precinct from November 2024 include:

- station entrance construction and underground build-out works at the City Square, Flinders Quarter and Federation Square sites
- ongoing work on above-ground structures at City Square including the station entrance canopy
- removal of one tower crane from Swanston Street near Flinders Lane
- uplifting of the Collins Street southern footpath near the site entrance
- widening of the pedestrian ramps at the southern side of Collins Street and Swanston Street intersection
- Campbell Arcade restoration works including fit out of the underground passenger connection to Flinders Street Station &train testing through the tunnel.

IMPACT Philanthropy Application Program

Perpetual Limited Grants

The IMPACT Philanthropy Application program allows philanthropists and not-forprofits (NFP's) to connect.

It allows NFP's to demonstrate how they improve outcomes for the communities in which they operate. They encourage high quality outcomes by identifying organisations that can maximise their impact through good governance, solid leadership, strong strategy and being outcomes focused.

Eligibility: Not-for-profits and universities, DGR Status is required.

Funding: up to \$120,000

Community Grants Program

Insignia Community Foundation

Tech Grants for NFPS

- Operates efficiently to maximise impact.
- Inclusive of all individuals & community groups regardless of background, race, ethnicity, age, gender, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, disability, economic status and other diverse backgrounds.
- Looks to address at least 1 of the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals.

Member Feature: Narcolepsy and Overwhelming Daytime Sleep Society

Narcolepsy and Overwhelming Daytime Sleep Society (NODSS) is a support group set up to help people with sleep disorders.

While we do tend to have more Narcoleptics as members, we provide counselling and information to people with any sleep disorder. NODSS is staffed entirely by volunteers and raises funds for its services through membership fees, donations and government grants.

A Brief History

NODSS was founded by psychologist Dr Dorothy Bruck in 1986, along with a small group of volunteers.

NODSS became an incorporated body in 1988, and was also classified as a public benevolent institution under the Tax Act (Australia). It also operates as a national body.

Another Remarkable Year for

TreeProject

For over two decades, TreeProject has been part of the Ross House community. Initiated in 1989 by two dedicated women with a mission to plant one million trees in Victoria, their passion has evolved into a significant legacy.

Fifteen years later, their goal was achieved, and more than 30 years on TreeProject has planted over two million trees, and counting.

This year brought many highlights, starting with an honourable nomination for a Landcare Award. These awards celebrate the efforts of innovative individuals and community groups working tirelessly to rejuvenate Victoria's landscapes. While we didn't take home the award, being in the same space, and learning about so many small but mighty projects, was an absolute inspiration.

TreeProject was also featured in the first-ever From the Ground Up film festival, hosted by the legendary Costa Georgiadis of Gardening Australia fame. We were thrilled to be one of eight organisations showcased for our commitment to environmental sustainability. TreeProject is unique in that we don't just plant trees - we grow them too. Urban volunteers are trained to cultivate indigenous seedlings in their backyards, nurturing them until they're ready for planting in regional Victoria.

These seedlings are then transported to rural landholders and Landcare groups in need, where yet another group of dedicated volunteers plants them. This model fosters collaboration between urban and rural communities, working together to restore Victoria's landscapes.

Looking ahead, 2025 is shaping up to be one of our biggest years yet. We're calling on nearly 500 volunteers to help grow over 156,000 native seedlings which will play a crucial role in repairing damaged ecosystems across the state.

Thanks to our incredible volunteers' time and energy we can keep costs low for farmers and landholders. For many of them, getting affordable seedlings from TreeProject is all the encouragement they need to start rejuvenating their land.

Empowering Women in Rural Communities

Assisi Aid Projects works with overseas partners to deliver impactful projects which economically empower women in rural communities across the Asia-Pacific region.

The projects, currently in India, Nepal and Indonesia, facilitate a range of activities including interest-free business loans and skills development, and provide practical support. Through the projects, women participants are empowered to start their own businesses and earn sustainable incomes, enabling them to be financially independent and support their families.

In Indonesia our Jajal Wae Sustainable Agri-Tourism project is implemented through our partner, Dreamdelion. The project takes place in the Ngawi region of East Java, where women often struggle to earn a sustainable income to support their families. The high levels of poverty, poor education, and discriminatory social and cultural norms have all resulted in women in the region having low wages and limited opportunities. The women must often leave their families to secure work in larger cities, the nature of which is often physically demanding and poorly paid.

The project helps alleviate this situation, enabling women to drive social change. Through economic empowerment the project establishes a formal ecotourism management group and helps to create business opportunities for over 170 women in remote villages. The project's activities enable the women to develop new business skills, set up effective Micro, Small and Medium-Enterprises, and profitably market and sell their products.

Ibu Arin, a midwife in the village of Girikerto, joined the project as she felt it offered a safe place and a community for women to be both socially and economically empowered. Using her background in health, Ibu Arin started a small business to sell healthy food products, made from local and natural ingredients free from preservatives, at the local market.

Ibu Arin believes the project is continuously supporting women to become financially independent and increasingly more confident in themselves.

64th Pioneer Women's Ceremony

The 64th Pioneer Women's Ceremony will again be held at the Pioneer Women's Memorial Garden in the Kings Domain, Melbourne.

This memorial garden of remembrance was created in Kings Domain as part of the 1934 celebration of the Centenary of Melbourne.

A variety of fundraising ventures occurred, including producing and selling a commemorative book, and receiving public subscriptions to have a particular woman's name inscribed on a "sheet of remembrance". These sheets are buried beneath the sundial in the garden.

The garden was designed by Hugh Linaker and is a formal, symmetrical garden traversed by a watercourse. This flows into a grotto which contains a bronze statue of a woman by the sculptor Charles Web Gilbert.

About the event

This event celebrates Victorian Pioneer Women, conducted annually by the National Council of Women of Victoria (NCWV) to acknowledge past and present women pioneers.

In 2025, we are acknowledging 30 years since the Australian Bureau of Statistics recognised, under occupations in the Census, that women could be farmers.

We are exploring the opportunity to participate in The City of Melbourne Open House Melbourne 2025, held over the weekend of 26th –27th July 2025.

We are proposing to open Ross House on Saturday, 26 July, from 9am to 6pm, as part of this city-wide event.

The 2025 theme, Stories of the City, highlights the hidden and overlooked layers of urban life through architecture, culture, and community. Ross House offers a unique story, reflecting both architectural and social history.


